A note on Trisha and Maureen's other childhood teachers

Miss Rushton was not qualified as a teacher, possibly because of her disability. However, she enjoyed immense success with her pupils; Trisha and Maureen caught the bus outside White Barn Farm aged 4 and 6 to go to Miss Rushton for lessons. A distant relative met them and escorted them to her house. Trisha stopped lessons with Miss Rushton at age 16, having achieved grade 7. After that, Maureen had double lessons. From the age of 13, Maureen had extra lessons with Mildred Litherland and left Miss Rushton at age 15. Mildred was a professor at the Royal Academy of Music, which Maureen eventually attended.

Memories of Molly by Amy Baker, a long-standing pupil

I started piano lessons with Molly aged 11 and little did I know then the impact that she would have on my life.

As a teacher she was strict, but only because she knew exactly what needed to be done and how. I have fond memories of her sitting at my right side as I played to her and being amazed when she could point out exactly which notes I had played wrong. She would also often put on a cassette or CD of a recording to show how the piece 'should be played'. I remember that she once, obviously knowing what was best for me(!), had arranged for me to start singing lessons with another local teacher. Being a very shy child, I remember being very upset that I'd have to sing in front of a stranger and felt slightly betrayed that she had arranged this without my knowledge. Of course, I soon settled into my singing lessons and now love singing... and I eventually forgave Molly for it!

Another memory is of doing my grade 8 exam at her house, knowing that she was by the other side of the door listening to every scale and piece that I played and every answer I gave. Of course, Molly had prepared me well and fortunately, everything went well, but I think I was relieved for her sake as much as my own, as I hadn't wanted to let her down. Once I left school, I enjoyed visiting her and Philip in my university holidays to have a catch up in the front room and play the piano to Molly.

Looking back, I can see that my life has many parallels to hers. I am now working as Head of Music in a high school in Northumberland, I teach piano privately and I direct a local community choir. I'll often hear her in my ear as I am giving advice to a piano student and she came to mind again at my choir concert a couple of weeks ago. I am hoping that she would be pleased that I am following in her footsteps and I'll be forever grateful that she was able to nurture my musical ability and that she helped to put me on the path that I am now on.
